A Family Profile:

Darlene (Auernheimer) Powers was born in Newton, Kansas, and grew up in Halstead, a small town west of Newton. She was baptized in 1973 in her home church, the First Mennonite Church of Halstead. After high school graduation in 1975, she went to Bethel College in North Newton, a Mennonite fine arts college, for three years. She was working toward becoming a math teacher, but later decided she didn't have what it took to handle all those kids!

Mike was born in Wichita, Kansas, where he attended schools through the eighth grade. He was raised in the Glad Tidings Assembly of God church, and was baptized at the age of 13. His family moved west, near Cheney Reservoir, and Mike attended Pretty Prairie High School, graduating in 1976. This is where Mike first met Mennonites, which led him to Bethel College that fall. (The scholarships helped, too!)

Mike's first roommate happened to be a distant cousin of Darlene's and that is how they first met. A year and several interesting stories later Mike and

Darlene were "best friends", and their other friends weren't surprised when they announced their engagement in February of 1978. They were married a year later on February 3, 1979. Mike graduated from Bethel College in May, 1981, with a degree in math/computer science, and a minor in art. (Darlene got a PHT degree -- "Put Husband Through.")

During this time, they became charter members in a new house church, Jubilee Mennonite, in North Newton. They also started a family: Laura, born in 1980, and James, born in 1982. In 1983 they moved on to join Faith Mennonite Church, Newton, where they took their turns being active in various ways, including being S.S. teachers, working in Women's Mission Circle, and helping to publish the church newsletter.

Mike worked as a computer systems programmer for KG&E, the electric company in Wichita, for 11 years, and then for Koch Industries for one year. Darlene stayed home to raise their two children, and got involved in volunteer work:

a teacher at a church-run preschool, and a library aide and PTO board member at their children's school. She also took on the Manager's job at the local food co-op, for almost 2 years.

After living in North Newton and Newton for almost 15 years, they moved to OKC for Mike's new job at Hertz Corporation in 1993. The transition was (and still is) hard for them all, leaving family and friends and "home" in Kansas. They joined Joy Mennonite Church in 1994, in a city which seems to swallow up most Mennonites with hardly a trace. Darlene is now song leader for the worship services, teaches S.S., and this past January she also became treasurer. Mike has taken his turn teaching the adult S.S. class, being one of many to help with an occasional meditation, and finds his computer skills and interests put to use in publishing this newsletter.

Laura, 16, has just finished her sophomore year at Putnam City West High School, where she has many new friends, though she still misses her close friends in Kansas. Her parents are struggling with

her "growing pains" and desires for independence! She has a driver's license now, and a part-time job at Applewood's Restaurant.

James, 14, has just finished his eighth grade year at Western Oaks Middle School and will be going to PCW next year. His greatest interest is our computer, both games and programming. His parents are struggling with his "growing pains" too -- he is suddenly taller than Darlene, and hasn't stopped yet!

Mike and Darlene are also struggling with their goals in life. Mike has developed health problems and is still searching for God's will in his career. Darlene just finished the Women's Career Development Course at OKC Community College, trying to figure out what she wants to do when she grows up, and will be taking more courses this summer in office administration and accounting.

One goal they all share: to return "home" to Kansas someday! But for now, they are working to make OKC and Joy Mennonite Church their home and family.


Worship News:


